September 2024Chelsea Foley, Ware Jr./Sr. High School

Chelsea is a standout soccer player for the Indians while maintaining a 4.3 GPA and being ranked 3rd in her class. She was nominated by Ware High School Athletic Director, Thomas Shamgochian.

As a six-year varsity soccer player and starter for Ware, she became a captain this year and serves as a great role model for her teammates. Chelsea is very active in Student Council, National Honor Society, National Spanish Honor Society and is the President of National Art Honor Society.

This year, Chelsea hosted her second annual "Gold Night" at Ware Jr./Sr. High School. Similar to last year, Chelsea set-up and managed the event from start to finish.



September 2024Christopher Acosta, East Boston High School

Chris is a standout soccer player for the Jets while maintaining a 3.9 GPA. He was nominated by his soccer coach, Jayson Smith.

As a three year varsity soccer player and starter for Eastie, he has exemplified what it means to be a true student-athlete. His coach commented that "His unwavering commitment to both academics and athletics sets him apart from his peers. His determination is not just about personal success; he is motivated by a desire to be the first in his family to graduate from college, inspiring those around him to strive for their goals as well."

As an athlete, Jake has had a stellar career in his three sports. This Fall, Jake has led the Hudson football team to an undefeated season and a great seed in the state tournament. Winders wrote, "Jake has been an impact athlete since entering his 9th grade year at HHS (2021-22). His immediate impact was felt during football, he was starting QB which is unheard of and single handedly turned this program around. He is a quiet kid, a quiet leader, who minds his own business and leads by example. He has gone on to be a true competitor in basketball, baseball and now track and field (a move he made last spring to improve his quickness and strength for football). I realize this isn't about his previous accolades but it is worth mentioning that in his first year with the track and field program he was a league all-star, league champion as part of the 4x100m relay, and placed 7th at D5 states in jayelin. Jake was a 1st team all-star for basketball as well."

In the classroom, Jake is taking three honors and two AP courses and has a current GPA of 3.82. He is an excellent student with a near perfect attendance record and a consistent member of the honor roll. Finally, as a member of the senior class, Jake helps out with HHS Boosters, volunteers at the snack shack and helps to run youth football clinics in town. It is evident that the next generation of student-athletes in Hudson look up to Jake and emulate his talent, work ethic, and sportsmanship.







November 2024Jason Fournier, Leicester High School

As Coach Everett said in his nomination, "Jason has demonstrated academic leadership and excellence at Leicester High School. He holds two major leadership positions within the Class of 2025. First, Jason's leadership and personality have led to his election as the Class of 2025's class treasurer over the last three consecutive years. I have seen Jason's leadership skills personally through his role as a member of the National Honor Society. Here, he utilized his experience in both cross country and track to create and coordinate a 5K road race at Leicester High School in May 2024. In this role, he organized a team of juniors to solicit donations and create a 5K course. All proceeds of this race went to the Leicester High School Boosters Club. The 5K event raised about \$2,000."

Academically, Jason is near the top of his class. He ranks 9th overall and 5th amongst male seniors. He has entered his senior year with a challenging workload which includes AP Calculus and a college level English course. Despite this heavy workload, he is currently set to earn High Honor Roll.



November 2024Ainsley Kearney, West Springfield High School

Ainsley was nominated by West Springfield Athletic Director Glenn Doulette, who stated that Ainsley is "an outstanding representative of our school community and a role model for other athletes."

As a student-athlete, Ainsley has had to overcome injuries, including ACL and shoulder surgeries but still managed to be a leader for her teams. She was all-league in field hockey and lacrosse in 2023 and 2024, and also won the Rookie of the Year Award, Coaches Award and MVP in field hockey during her career. She also is an MIAA Student Ambassador and captain of the field hockey and lacrosse teams.

As a student, Ainsley is ranked No. 2 in her class of 257 students. A consistent member of the Honor Roll and National Honor Society member, Ainsley also was selected to the MSFHCA Academic All-Star Team in 2023. Winning team Academic Awards for Field Hockey and Lacrosse, she was also a member of the Irish Club for four years. Ainsley was elected Class of 2025 President for two years and Secretary for one year.

As a strong community member, Ainsley championed the campaign for raising money to benefit Morgan's Message (Mental Health for Athletes) and assisted with local charities Rays Of Hope and the Holyoke Veterans Home. Both of these efforts raised well over \$1,000 for each charity.

Nominated by Track Coach Moira Nobili, Elizabeth Sanders is a tremendous student-athlete for the Warriors. Liz has excelled on the Soccer, Indoor and Outdoor Track Teams, combining her athletic prowess with her academic achievements and community service.

As an athlete, Liz has participated on the Varsity Soccer Team since her freshmen year and was awarded the 2023 Sportsmanship Award Winner for Cape and Islands League and the 2023 Nauset Coaches Award. She has also been a tremendous team member on the Indoor and Outdoor Track Teams since her freshman year.

As a student, Liz has enrolled in a schedule including AP Language, AP US History, Honors Chemistry, AP Civics and Government, Honors Physics, Honors Civics and Government, Algebra II, Biotechnology, American Sign Language III, Intro to Business, Yoga, Sports & Entertainment Marketing, Clay, Art and Relaxation. In addition, Liz has utilized American Sign Language during her summer work at a toy store in Chatham to speak to clients.

February 2025 Alexandra Eastman, Sandwich High School

Nominated by Coach Wendy Pierce, Alexandra Eastman excels in Cross Country, Swimming, and Track, maintaining a 4.1 GPA. A dual-sport captain, she's a dedicated teammate and consistently strives for excellence.

Her transcript reveals a student that challenges herself throughout the school year. Lexi has taken 6 AP courses: Chemistry, English Language & Composition, World History, Biology, Calculus, Psychology and several Honors-level courses: English 9 & 10, Geometry, Spanish 2, 3, & 4; Precalculus., Biology and Chemistry. The amazing part of the academic journey is that Lexi's transcript is an astonishing all A's. To date, she has not received a grade lower than A-.

In addition to the above accolades and accomplishments, Lexi is a servant to her community and involved in numerous activities. Among the highlights are her involvement with the Key Club and the National Honor Society where Lexi has taken part in multiple community events and fundraisers. Through GLASSS (Girls Leadership Academy for Service and Sports) and the Leadership and Community Service Trip, Lexi went to Costa Rica for 10 days as a Junior to participate in service projects. She has participated in many fundraisers for various charities (cancer, hunger, athletics) and constantly displays leadership. Alyse was nominated by her coach, Michelle Roach. A three-sport athlete at North Reading Alyse excels at Field Hockey, Ice Hockey, and Softball while maintaining a 3.84 GPA.

As an athlete, Alyse has played a sport in every season but her true love is ice hockey where she attained great accolades. She set program records in the following categories: fewest goals allowed in a single season (16), most shutouts in a single season (11), most career shutouts (32), and most career wins (62). This past season she was also named the Boston Globe Player of the Week (week of February 10) and the North Reading High School Winter Sports MVP. As Casey Grange said in his nomination, "Drew is a true student-athlete. He works extremely hard in the classroom and on the football field and track. There is never a question of what we will get when Drew commits to something - it's always his best. He is a quiet leader who leads by example and is as humble as they come. Drew simply puts his head down and gets to work to make himself and the people around him better but he also is the first to celebrate his teammates' successes."



April 2025Amelia Spencer, Winthrop High School

A formidable three-sport athlete throughout her high school career, Amelia has demonstrated outstanding leadership and skill. She is a captain of the Winthrop Varsity Ice Hockey team, where she has been a starter since her freshman year. Last year, she was named NEC All-Star in hockey. As a senior captain, she led her team to three conference titles in four years. Her impressive performance as a defenseman includes averaging over a point per game.

Beyond the rink, Amelia has played varsity soccer as a goalie and served as a two-time team captain on the varsity softball team. Her athletic involvement extends to leadership roles as a Bay State Games Student Ambassador, a Morgan's Message Ambassador, an MIAA Student Ambassador, and a member of the MIAA Student Advisory Committee. In recognition of her leadership, she received the Leadership Award for the varsity softball team.

More significantly, Lucas's academic performance blossomed. Embracing the importance of education, he earned an athletic scholarship to the University of Rhode Island. This dual transformation, both athletic and academic, stands as an inspiring example for the entire Brockton student body.

Outside of his personal achievements, Lucas actively mentors the next generation by volunteering with the Brockton youth track club, passing on his invaluable knowledge and skills. With the strong backing of his family, Lucas embodies what it means to be a Boxer Success Story.





Jack Aalto is a sophomore at Catholic Memorial and has attended the school since seventh grade. Jack has been an honors student each year and is currently taking Algebra II Honors, English 10 Honors, Western Civilization Honors, and Spanish 3, along with Sophomore Theology and Chemistry.

Jack is an exceptional student, achieving First Honors each semester and has participated on the State Champion Speech & Debate Team at CM, achieving 'state finalist' multiple times in speech competitions.

Jack was diagnosed with a heart defect at age 3, and was told early on that at some point in the future he would need a heart transplant. Jack continued through his childhood years, and early adolescent years as a normal boy, going to school, playing sports, making friends, and being involved in the school community.

When Jack was in the 7th and 8th grades at Catholic Memorial, he played on the middle school hockey teams, as well as Parkway Youth Hockey town teams. As Jack was graduating from eighth grade, his team of heart doctors told him that his "hockey playing days were over" with the concern for the physical contact nature of hockey. Jack was devastated to say the least.

The Varsity Hockey Coach at Catholic Memorial, approached Jack and his parents and asked if Jack would be the Varsity Hockey Student-Manager for the next 4 years. Jack was thrilled and the following year, as a freshman, Jack served in this role, helping to handle all equipment needs, game management of score sheets, and providing leadership and team spirit within the team. He was a terrific addition to the team, earning his first varsity letter.

Jack Aalto Catholic Memorial School

At the end of Jack's freshman year, the team of heart doctors met with him and his parents and explained the need to begin the heart transplant process that would require staying at Boston Children's Hospital during the summer of 2024, for a heart donation to become available. Jack went to Boston Children's Hospital in late June and received his heart transplant on August 22, 2024. Jack would spend another four weeks at Boston Children's Hospital in recovery and is now back in the classroom at Catholic Memorial thriving and serving as "lead" student-manager for the varsity ice hockey team.

While Jack was in Boston Children's Hospital, he tutored other patients who were waiting for a transplant or being cared for at the hospital. Jack also volunteers through Rose's Bounty, assisting those in need in the Greater Boston community.

Julianne goes the extra mile for her students, putting their experience and learning before all else. She works tirelessly to present material in a manner that allows each student the opportunity to find themselves in their role, whether as a writer, director, actor, set designer, crew member, or musician. She gives her all to her students to ensure that each one is known, cared for, and feels valued. Her driving motivation is creating inclusive and safe spaces for students, reminding them that there is a place for everyone and that every person and their unique talents deserve to be celebrated. Her classes and productions are inventive and engaging, pushing herself and her students to think outside of the box. One such example is the Spring 2024 production of the musical, Pippin.

Pippin is the story of a young prince in the Middle Ages who searches for his place in the world and his reason for being. Julianne wanted to bring the story into a setting that would immediately resonate with adolescents in the present day. She took the play from the middle ages to a modern junkyard, complete with punk costumes and gritty surroundings. Students contributed to the construction of a set, costumes, hair, and makeup that invoked an edgy vibe. In addition, students envisioned and executed production elements not before seen in a rendition of Pippin, including

original student artwork that contributed to the plot progression.

Julianne also incorporated student musicians as street performers into the production. Traditionally in Pippin, the actors are not responsible for providing music on stage during the show; it all comes from the orchestra pit. In this rendition of the production, on-stage student performers brought the music right into the scene, supported by student and professional musicians in the pit. These aspects provided a unique pathway for showcasing the visual arts, music, and theater in one production. From lighting design to set construction, costuming, hair and makeup, music, acting, choreography, dance, and the creation of original artwork, Julianne provided opportunities for artistic expression and creative development for students across all areas of the fine and performing arts, giving each student the opportunity to find his or her unique place in the production process.

The production of Pippin is just one example of how Julianne approaches everything she does with tremendous heart. She goes above and beyond as both a teacher and director, spending significant time ensuring that her classes and productions are thought-provoking, fresh, and resonate with the students under her direction. She has turned the school's theater into something that students want to be a part of and audiences want to attend. The school's 400-seat theater is routinely sold out for performances, and standing ovations are the norm. Her inclusive approach to both teaching and directing has resulted in hundreds of students finding a home and inspiration in the theater, something they might not have considered if they had not taken one of her classes, gained the courage to audition, signed up for the crew, or attended a show to support their friends and classmates.







Over time, when a player accepts the process, and buys into the training, that's where I see their development and confidence shine. This all helps with the success of our team.
